DIRCETOR'S CORNER

As I observed the OSAA Classification & Districting Committee meeting on March18th, I was reminded what a great process we have in Oregon for change. The OSAA board room was standing room only, as over 50 superintendents, principals, athletic directors and coaches representing all six classifications came to testify regarding the committee's Proposal #5. Individuals came from throughout the state, some in support of the Proposal, some wanting minor changes and some wanting the committee to start over and look at different possibilities. I could not help but think whatever the outcome, we must not take for granted the ability to have input and dialog.

The committee membership itself mirrors the makeup of the OSAA Executive Board, thus having representation from all six classifications plus a member from the Oregon Athletic Coaches Association (John Beck, Crater HS), the Oregon Athletic Directors Association, the Oregon School Boards Association and the Oregon Athletic Officials Association. Our state is unique in as most governing bodies in high school sports do not have this kind of representation. Recently, the National Organization for Coaches Association Directors (NOCAD) asked for a survey on what states had a coaches association member on their state's governing body, similar to the OSAA. Results so far show that Oregon is the only state that has a representative on their state board. Tony Koontz represents the OACA on the OSAA Executive Board. Some of the states that have responded to the survey include Florida, North and South Carolina, Michigan, Indiana, Montana, Nevada, Wisconsin, Nebraska and the list goes on.

We should feel fortunate that we coach in a state where we have not only input and a process for change but also have representation in the decision making process.

ALL SPORTS STANDINGS

(HOW THE WINNERS ARE DETERMINED)

Because the OACA Awards Banquet is held in May, we use the previous year's spring results and the following fall & winter results to determine the winners. For example, at this year's Banquet we will be honoring the 2012-2013 All Sports Winners (spring of 2012 and fall & winter of 2013).

There are 6 All Sports Awards given each year—one for each classification. This combines every sport and both boys and girls combined results.

The following are criteria for how the All Sports Standings are determined:

- 1. At the end of every state tournament points are awarded from 1st to 8th place with the champion receiving 16 points and the 8th place 2 points. In the event of a tie, the points are then split. However, not every sport is calculated the same way. For example, soccer uses a different point system with the champion and runner up getting 16 & 14 points respectfully, then the two semifinalists getting 11 pts. each and the 4 quarterfinalists receiving 5 points a piece.
- 2. A database is kept of each school, sport, classification and gender. The points are imputed after each season.
- 3. After all three sports seasons are over the points are computed and the school with the most points is named as that year's All Sports Winner for their classification. The winners are presented a plaque and honored at our OACA Awards Banquet that is held in May.
- 4. We publish the results in our Summer Newsletter as well as the Oregon Coaches Directory.

Oregon Athletic Coaches Association/OSAA Executive Board Report Spring 2013 Report Tony Koontz

Greetings from the OACA and the OSAA! This winter has been a very busy time at the OSAA Executive board. As you know, we are approaching the end our four year classification cycle and the Classification Committee(John Beck Crater HS, Head Football is your representative) is in full swing in determining how we proceed. Please take a look on the OSAA website to view the most current proposal and give them your input, whether it be public testimony or written. Currently, the committee has settled in principle on a 6 class system. Nothing is "set in stone" at this time, however final decisions will be made in October of 2013. It is imperative that each class review their placement and become involved in the process.

Below you will find a summary of other pertinent discussion and decisions:

• Volleyball Participation Limitations were amended including how play dates and matches would be counted. This involves "pool play" at tournaments as well. Check the OSAA website and previous broadcast emails for details.

• Approved the inclusion of interrupted contests in baseball and softball during the regular season to continue from the point of interruption as it is done at the state playoff level. This was initiated by the OACA.

• First readings were made on two issues: 1) A recommendation by the Sports Medicine Advisory Committee (SMAC) in require coaches to complete the NFHS Guide to Heat and Acclimatization and Heat IIIness Prevention every two years. This is a free course and provides valuable information that will enable coaches to be well versed in heat and heat illness. 2) A recommendation by the SMAC regarding the Practice Model implementation for the fall of 2014. Again, please look this over carefully as it has profound impacts on the practice models we all use, especially for football and other fall sports. This is to be an action on the May 6 Executive Meeting.

• Voted to approve a change in the scoring procedures at the 6A Tennis State Championships beginning this spring.

Other committee's that are currently meeting and are in need of your input are the **Rankings Committee** (Chris Roche, Wilsonville HS, Basketball, Justn Corey, Junction City, Soccer, Kim McClain, Santiam Christian, Volleyball, Tony Smith, St. Paul, Football are your representative) and the **Officials Review Committee**. Please look at the most recent update on these two committee's so that you can have input in a timely fashion. The **State Championship Committee** (Jennifer Teeter, Imbler HS Volleyball Coach represents you) will soon start meeting)

All in all, a very busy year with topics that have a profound impact on what we do as coaches. Please don't hesitate to drop me an email or give me a call if you want to discuss one of the issues or weigh in on a particular topic. I'd be happy to talk with you.

Honoring a 2-9 Coach Proactive Coaching Newsletter #87 Bruce E. Brown – **www.proactivecoaching.info** Most people evaluate themselves based on what they think they are capable of accomplishing but others judge us based upon what we have already accomplished – especially in coaching. So it was a pleasant surprise at the end of the football season to see an athletic director look beyond the win/loss record of the coach to make his decision. Jody Sears came to Ogden Utah to join the staff of new head coach John L. Smith at Weber State University in November of 2011. Several days after the conclusion of spring practice, Coach Smith unexpectedly left Weber for the head coaching position at Arkansas. On April 23rd of 2012, Coach Sears was named interim head coach. The team won two games while losing nine. On the 21st of November, Athletic Director Jerry Bovee offered the interim coach a three year contract to lead the Wildcat football program. "Coach Sears did a wonderful job of keeping our team together and leading the Wildcat football program," Bovee said. "He did it with style and class, engaging the community and fans in a positive way, all while maintaining stability in our program. Under Coach Sears' leadership, the team competed each week despite the difficult situation they faced this year with three head coaches in such a short time."

Many times the great coaching jobs go unnoticed because the results on the scoreboard completely overshadow everything else. It is often requires a stronger coach to be "successful" when things are difficult than it does when they are winning. The best coaching accomplishments can often happen when a team is not winning on the scoreboard. Some coaches on teams that are losing start motivating through fear and intimidation. They throw players and assistant coaches under the bus. They blame referees, coach angry, frustrated or even quit working as hard. The best coaches when faced with a difficult season have the ability to keep a high level of trust which is shown in continuous effort. What should you see to know if a coach with a losing record is still successful? Go watch them practice and you will see a team still living their core covenants. There will be visible trust. Players will trust their training, they will remain loyal, engaged, energetic, practice hard and purposefully. They finish strong. They stay confident, competitive and united to the end by competing every time they take the field. Coaches and team leaders look forward to practice and stay positive, aggressive and accountable. Players who are fully committed to the team covenants feel valued. The coaches still love their players and the players love and respect their coaches.

Proactive Coaching Thought... A coach who can do these things in tough times needs to be supported and they will eventually be winning on the scoreboard. We have had the honor of knowing and working with Jody Sears. Coach Sears and Jerry Bovee are a credit to our profession. Well done Weber State!
