DIRECTOR'S CORNER

This school year, the OACA has been celebrating its 87th year of serving high school coaches in our state. It has been a busy and productive year as we returned to a regular sport calendar and state playoffs. Last month, we honored over 250 coaches and family members at the 36th annual OACA Awards Banquet. In 1986, the first OACA "Coach of the Year" Banquet was held with 50-60 coaches in attendance. At this year's Banquet we honored thirteen graduating seniors with



scholarships totaling \$19,000. For a complete list of all the scholarship award winners see page 7 of the newsletter. Including scholarship award winners, this year, a total of over \$290,000 has been awarded to OACA families over the 37 years of the scholarship program. We greatly appreciate our Scholarship Sponsors, Pacific Office Automation, BSN Sports, Hudl, MaxPreps, Leading Edge Fundraising, Prime Time Sports, Oregon State Credit Union, the Sheraton/Pollin Hotels, and Dave Dowling who provide funds that go directly to our scholar athletes.

We would like to announce a change in the purchase of an OACA Gold Card. Due to continued credit card processing costs, the cost of an OACA Gold Card Membership when purchased by credit card/PayPal will be \$68, a \$3 increase. If you pay by check/cash the cost will remain \$65. The retired Gold Card (\$55) and Regular (\$50) remain the same as previous years.

As I observed the numerous OSAA Committees this year, including the Classification & Districting, State Championship and Football Ad Hoc Committees, I was reminded what a great process we have in Oregon for change. I could not help but think whatever the outcome, we must not take for granted the ability to have input and dialogue. The various committee's membership mirrors the makeup of the OSAA Executive Board, thus having representation from all six classifications plus a member from the Oregon Athletic Coaches Association, the Oregon Athletic Directors Association, the Oregon School Boards Association, and the Oregon Athletic Officials Association. Our state is unique as most governing bodies in high school sports do not have this kind of representation.

The 2021-22 OACA Board of Directors and Sports Chairs provided outstanding leadership for the OACA and Oregon HS Coaches. We appreciate their service and support as we strive to promote and enhance the coaching profession in our state. A big thanks needs to go to Board President, Tony Smith, St. Paul High School, for his outstanding leadership as we have navigated through the last two years. DIRECTOR'S CORNER

We really need to give the high school coaches in the state of Oregon a "pat on the back". Our coaches are doing an absolutely fantastic job of developing players. Some recent examples: four players that attended high schools in Oregon were selected in the NFL draft (and several others signed free agent deals), the NBA's Eastern Conference Finals had two opposing head coaches, as well as several assistants and a player, that prepped in Oregon, an Olympic Gold medalist and World Record Holder in Track and Field and many others that dot the professional level landscape and are excelling. Although this is not one of the objectives, it is the result of great athletes receiving excellent coaching. This is a tribute to our coaches in the state in all sports at all levels. Great job, coaches!!

The OACA is constantly encouraging coaches to promote athletes to play multiple sports. In the book, Grit by Angela Duckworth, she details the various measures that have analyzed the question, "is grit or perseverance developed or is a person born with it"? Through hundreds of thousands of students examining over one hundred components like; GPA, standardized tests, interviews, etc., the determining factor was high school students that participated in more than one activity for over a year displayed more "grit", became more successful, earned more money in their career, etc. So, please continue to educate student-athletes and parents to participate in multiple sports.

In fact, the NFL draft certainly points to playing multiple sports:

100% of the first-round picks played multiple sports in high school.

89% of the players drafted in the entire draft were multi-sport athletes in high school.

43% were 3+ sport athletes in high school.

This is incredible data that points to the many great benefits of playing multiple sports in high school.

OACA MEMBERSHIP 2022-2023

Membership dues when paid by credit card/PayPal have changed for the coming school year due to the increasing credit card processing fees. Our membership dues are:

Gold Card Membership (must be ASEP/NFHS Certified) - \$68 when purchased by credit card/PayPal \$65 when purchased with cash or check

Retired Gold Card Membership - \$55 is offered to retired coaches who are no longer coaching *or* teaching and have coached at least ten (10) years at the MS, HS or college level.

Regular Membership - \$50 (does not require ASEP or NFHS Certification)

There are many benefits to being an OACA member. A \$2,000,000 liability insurance benefit that covers you for all coaching and teaching activities in/out of season, camp insurance eligibility, reduced-fee sports clinics, OACA e-newsletters, representation for each sport/class to the OSAA for the purpose of improving high school athletics, recognition at our annual awards banquet, state and national awards, eight \$1,000 student scholarships for high school graduating sons and daughters of our members, and a \$50,000 sexual abuse coverage for litigation cost to member who was unjustly accused. We are pleased to announce a new benefit for our Gold Card members as a part of our partnership with the Sheraton Portland Airport Hotel. When traveling, you are eligible for 20% off of a single night room rate including free shuttle to and from the airport and up to 14 days of free parking.

Please Note: Only the Gold Card & Retired Gold Card admits you to High School/OSAA events.

You will receive your Gold Cards electronically through an email from the OSAA Website, Subject line: "2022-23 OSAA Gold Card." The email contains a link for your card and instructions on how to save the link to your mobile device. We recognize that some members do not have a smart phone. Membership hard copies are available for those individuals. Both the Digital and Hard Copies are valid for admission into HS/OSAA events. If your phone is unable to process a digital card, contact our office @ 541-928-2700 or laura@oregoncoach.org.

OACA Liability Insurance Info:

The liability coverage policy period is August 1 – July 31. It covers the coach during their season, off-season workouts, and during summer activities. College and Youth Coaches are not covered by the Liability Insurance policy, the policy only covers High School and Middle School Coaches. As a 2022-23 OACA Member you are covered during this summer's activities. After July 31, our new membership year will begin and you will need to sign up again to be covered Aug. 1st, 2022-July 31st, 2023. With the summer waiver being extended through August 7th, you will want to make sure that you get yourself registered right away for the new school year so you have no lapse in your insurance.

It is in your best interest to sign up for your membership at the beginning of each membership year and take advantage of the entire membership year. It does not matter if you coach a winter or spring sport, you can sign up for your membership as soon as the new school year opens and have the benefit of your insurance for the entire membership year that also covers you when you are in the classroom. Online Membership Registration for the 2022-23 school year will begin on July 1st at www.oregoncoach.org. Please note: While Membership Registration begins on July 1st, digital and hard copies of cards will not be sent out until early August.

WHERE ARE THEY NOW?

My name is Amber Lease, and I am from Klamath Falls, Oregon. I attended Mazama High School where I was a recipient of the 2016 OACA Scholarship.

After graduating from Mazama High School in 2016, I attended Lane Community College on a basketball scholarship. In two years, I completed three associate degrees, was a 2x NWAC All-Region Defensive Team Awardee and a $2^{\rm nd}$ Team NWAC All-Region Awardee. During my studies at Lane, I was an athletic tutor in the subjects of math, English, and computer skills.

After completing two years at Lane Community College, I received a scholarship to attend Vancouver Island University (VIU) in British Columbia, Canada. On my initial visit I instantly fell in love with Vancouver Island and in Canada collegiate athletes have five years of eligibility instead of just four. So obviously, I was going to Canada! I attended VIU in the fall of 2018 and just recently completed my time up north. In 2018-2019 we completed the season with a PacWest Conference Championship and 4th place finish in the country. The 2019-2020 season is when everyone's worst nightmare happened. We had been chosen to host the national tournament at the end of March and were currently ranked #1 in the country after winning the PacWest Championship for a second time when COVID-19 struck and canceled the remainder of our season.



I returned to VIU in the fall of 2020 with hopes for a basketball season to just be shattered after getting out of a two-week quarantine. Again, the 2020-21 season was canceled. Graduating in June of 2021, I had initially decided that my basketball career was over even with one more year left of eligibility. After a few months I had ended up back in the gym and was questioning the decision I had made. Shortly after, I got on the phone and made a call to my coach. Before I knew it, I was back at VIU for the 2021-22 basketball season. My last year was the best year I could have asked for. We hosted the national tournament at VIU where we lost in the national championship in overtime. Although the ending was devastating, I'm forever grateful for the opportunities I received to have a fitting conclusion to a storybook career. My career

ended as a 3-time All-Canadian, a 3-time First Team All-Star, CCAA First Team National Tournament Team, 2-time PacWest Champion, and 2nd and 4th place finishes at the National Tournament.

In my final year at VIU I was the Lead Student Ambassador. I informed prospective students of the amazing opportunities VIU has

to offer and assisted the University in showcasing their beautiful campus. Being a part of the OCCEL not only made me a better leader outside of the classroom but made me a better leader on the court.

I am now teaching math at Crater High School and am an Assistant Varsity Girls Basketball Coach. As my parents say, I got the "bug", the coaching bug. Coaches have had some of the biggest influences on my life and I hope that one day I can be that for athletes. The OACA influences hundreds of student athletes' lives each year and I am fortunate enough to have been one of those student athletes.

Title IX Milestones: Oregon Olympian Joni Huntley Elevated HS Track & Field with National High Jump Record



Olympic track and field star Joni Huntley reached new heights at Sheridan (Oregon) High School, winning six Oregon School Activities Association (OSAA) titles from 1972-74 and setting a U.S. record by clearing 6 feet as a senior. She also won titles in the 100-yard dash and 100-meter high hurdles in 1974.

Throughout 1974 and 1975, Huntley bettered the American record four times and served as U.S. champion from 1974-77. Her 6-foot jump that also established the state meet record in 1974 held up until the 2013 track and field season. At that time, it was the oldest meet record in any classification recognized by the OSAA.

Huntley later attended Oregon State University. As a member of the OSU program, she won four consecutive national titles in the high jump as well as conference titles in 1975 in the high hurdles, long jump and high jump. Huntley's 1976 jump of 6-feet-2 ¾ inches set an Oregon State record that remained through 2012.

The Sheridan native's impact globally was first felt in 1975 when she captured gold at the Pan American Games. That accomplishment helped earn her the No. 3 ranking in the world that year. In 1976, she participated in her first Olympic Games. Her efforts resulted in a fifth-place finish that year in Montreal. Following the 1980 Olympic boycott, she returned to action and earned a bronze medal in the 1984 Olympic Games in Los Angeles.

Huntley was inducted into the National High School Hall of Fame in 2016. She previously was inducted into the Oregon State University Athletics Hall of Fame in 1988 and the Oregon Sports Hall of Fame in 1990. #TitleIXat50

WHERE ARE THEY NOW?

My name is Micah Masei, and I am grateful to have been a 2017 OACA scholarship recipient and graduate from West Salem High School.

In high school, I had been a dual sport athlete competing in Swimming and Track & Field for all four years, earning 8 varsity letters and competing in 5 state championships. As I look back to my high school years, having the chance to compete against great athletes, making lasting friendships, and working with different coaches from around the state, prepared me for tremendous success in the next steps of my career.





In my time at West Salem, I graduated as a Scholar Athlete, Male Titan of the year, 6A State Champion in pole vault (2016), State Champion relay member in Swimming (2016), state runner up in both sports (2017), while setting multiple school and district records in both sports. Although I competed as an individual, I owe it to many different coaches to continuously push me to become better and my teammates to always remind me to have fun. Despite being successful and earing scholarships in both sports, I had to choose one to pursue while getting a higher education. My main goal growing up had always been to earn a scholarship to compete at a D1 college, as I really wanted to compete at next level. At the beginning of my senior year of high school, with the help of everyone around me, I had made it a reality. I had decided to commit early to swim at the University of Hawaii.

After graduating I had to put my skills to the test. College started up in August and so did training. As a freshman, everything was new to me, learning all the ins and outs of classes while trying to fit your body to

the rigorous schedule of sports was not easy. Luckily, as a young ambitious freshman I had taken this duty upon myself and faced it head-on, "No rest for the wicked" I would say. Junior year Covid had hit and unlike many other people, this had actually saved me from burnout. Practices were canceled, I had energy and despite being confined to certain spaces, people were still able to go outside. This lifestyle shift had made me realize the need for work-life balance. Sure, I wish I could've dropped more time in my swims as I did in freshman, and sophomore year, but at what cost? I was fortunate to earn All-Conference recognition as a swimmer and scholar athlete and swim at the 2019 FINA World Championships in Korea.



At the end of my senior year, I couldn't have imagined that it would've gone so fast. I remember getting out of practice near the end of the season and being surprised by a senior day celebration organized by our teammates. This was one of my core memories from this season. I'm not going to remember much of how fast I went or any practice, but I will definitely remember the times I spent with my teammates and all the experiences we've shared.



After graduation, swimming was not over for me. I had been offered a spot to compete on the American Samoa Olympic team. This was an amazing, unreal opportunity that I couldn't even wrap my head around. My whole life I had never imagined having the honor to attend such a high-level event, and here I was. Over the next few months, I had put my head down and lit the fire that had slowly dwindled over the years. I was representing such a bigger cause than just myself now and I wanted to do it right. Although Covid regulations were still in effect, I had gotten to spend 10 days in the Olympic Village and participate in the Opening Ceremony. I can vividly remember, as the announcer read aloud "American Samoa", we were dressed in full traditional wear walking out of the tunnel and into this gigantic stadium surrounded by lights, I had looked up at my flag and I was truly in awe.

Finishing up the summer in Tokyo I had been offered a position as the Graduate Assistant Coach for the Hawaii Swim and Dive team, as I pursued my Master of Science in Finance. I knew I had the right experience to give back to the program and hopefully bridge the gap between coach and athlete. I was

now in a leadership, supervision, and support role for many of my former teammates. This was an amazing experience for me to continue to be a part of that program and now take on the role that can shape so many lives. Although I take pride in my athletic success it is nothing without recognition of the journey, outstanding organizations and amazing people I've met along the way. Thank you to the OACA for supporting young student athletes like myself and encouraging us to pursue our dreams and aspirations after high school.





Financial Empowerment for our Communities

We know that many schoolteachers continue to spend their own personal money on classroom supplies and resources. In support of those teachers, the credit union offers \$15,000 a year in small classroom grants (\$300 or less) for supplies that may not be otherwise available. Some examples have included additional library books, digital cameras and microscopes.

Annually, Oregon State Credit Union awards ten \$2,500 college scholarships to eligible high school seniors who plan to attend an Oregon college or university.

Our full time Community Education Director is focused solely on outreach and education, partnering with countless local community schools and nonprofits to deliver financial education. Partnerships include Yamhill Housing Authority, The Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde, Junior Achievement, the Oregon Department of Corrections, and many others.
